Birds

Grow shrubs and trees with fruit, berries and seeds to feed birds in the Autumn and Winter. Avoid using chemical insecticides as birds rely on insects for food and will in turn help to keep pests at bay.

Plants that have nectar rich flowers provide food for butterflies. They also need foliage plants to act as a host on which to lay their eggs. (marked with *)
